PASTOR TO PEOPLE—FRANKLY SPEAKING

Money. Money. Money. It seems to dominate our lives—for better or worse. A couple of weeks ago I decided to watch the evening news on a national network with this task in mind: I would count how many times there was a direct or indirect reference to money. It was amazing. About twenty references to money in a thirty minute news cast! Try it sometime. It's fascinating. We are a money obsessed culture.

We are fighting a lingering recession, for sure in terms of a slow job market and a housing and building slump. We are faced with a titanic national debt and budget shortfalls at all levels of government. Now we face a truly massive need in Haiti that will takes years and millions of dollars to cope with. So it is no wonder that families feel squeezed financially. It's been a tough time financially, exacerbated by what one friend called our "financial 9/11" last year.

So now I want to add to the conversation some words about St. Andrew's financial situation. If you came to the Congregational Meeting January 24, you heard that for the year of our Lord 2009 we were in the red \$3768, that is, the church's budget ran a small deficit on our total budget of about \$301,000. Given what other congregations and non-profit institutions faced in 2009, that was really rather wonderful that our deficit was so small. That is the good news and for that we are grateful to God and grateful to you, the generous folks of St. Andrew.

What we face in 2010 is a bit more challenging. The Session passed a budget of about \$305,000(see the next page of our newsletter) for this coming year. However, we now forecast a shortfall of almost \$14,000. In my tenure as your pastor over the last eleven years we have never faced such a shortfall. Here are my two hopes: First, the Session will be careful stewards of your gifts and very prudent in our spending. In other words, we hope to monitor closely our expenses. That we promise to do as a Session.

Secondly, my hope is that you the people of St. Andrew will continue your long history of generosity of spirit and generosity of giving. I hope that some of you who have not yet pledged will do so. We have pledge cards in the church office. And those of you who have been blessed with abundance will consider sharing even more this year to help our congregation meet its commitments. Perhaps if your personal situation improves, you may wish to consider giving more. I am acutely aware that for many of you, that is simply not possible. Whatever gifts you offer to God are truly appreciated. I hope that many of you facing real financial hard times will be blessed this coming year and that God meets your needs. We can all pray that the general economy in our nation will improve this coming year and that God will provide all people, especially the poor, what they need.

So let us be of good cheer, trusting our God who is faithful to all our needs.

From Rev. Laura Dunham's Graceful Living: Your Faith, Values, and Money in Changing Times

"For those of you who would like to become more generous and less attached to our possessions and status, the practice of several of the spiritual disciplines can help: frugality, simplicity and generosity are especially helpful in fostering new attitudes toward the role of money in our lives. It may also help to create a money autobiography as well as reviewing our spending, saving and giving habits. These practices of graceful living will help us center our lives in God rather than the culture of consumerism. Giving freely and joyfully, as a result of living frugally and simply, to causes and people we believe in can give us a whole new perspective on life, one in which we grow toward that wholeness, peace of mind, balance and justice that reflect God's Shalom, that wonderful combination of peace and justice in our world."

BOARD OF DEACONS REPORT

In January I assumed the mantle of moderator of the board of deacons, with heart-felt gratitude, admiration and appreciation for my predecessor, Dorothy Street. It is a genuine, eye-opening privilege to serve with the St. Andrew deacons. So much of what the deacons do is consciously behind the scenes. Within the past month alone, the deacons sent 54 cards, made 18 home and hospital visits and 32 phone calls – over a hundred personal contacts ministering to members. One thing that I appreciate about being a deacon is that it prompts me actually to do the service that Christ calls us all to do, but that is so easy to let pass by in the midst of a busy life. If the Session represents the mind of a congregation, the deacons surely are its heart – agape in action.

Each parish at St. Andrew is like a family, and every parish and member has a personal deacon and elder. Do you know who yours are? The membership of parishes is listed at the back of the St. Andrew directory, and there have been some changes. Please thank and pray for these ordained officers who serve on our behalf. In addition to looking after a parish flock, the deacons also pack lunch sacks every week to be distributed to the homeless, prepare and clean up the communion elements for worship, arrange for greeters every Sunday, visit homebound members regularly, coordinate St. Andrew's participation in Project Share feeding the homeless, assist Gail with memorial services, and keep the congregation in contact with those who serve in the military. Among those who were especially in our thoughts, prayers, and actions this month have been: Donna , Doe , Jacob and Judy , Melissa , Patsy , Dorothy , Emmett , Fran , Virginia , Harris , and Chuck , as well as Ralph and Bennett who moved to assisted living in Texas.

This year you can also expect to hear from your deacon about opportunities for spiritual conversations within parish gatherings. Deacons historically look after the spiritual as well as physical health and concerns of the congregation. We take this charge seriously, and look forward to the movement of Christ's spirit in our midst in the coming year.

ASH WEDNESDAY

Christ's resurrection is the central event of the Christian faith and our celebration of that event on Easter Sunday is the most important day of the Christian year. It is fitting that we prepare ourselves for that day with prayer, meditation, and worship during the season of Lent. On Ash Wednesday we will observe the first day of Lent by confessing our brokenness, receiving absolution through the grace of God, and considering discipleship as our response to that grace.

The service will include the application of ashes to symbolize our repentance. Examples of the use of ashes in this way can be found in Job 42:1-6, 2 Samuel 13:19, Esther 4:1-3, Isaiah 61:1-3, Jeremiah 6:22-26, Ezekiel 27:30-31, Daniel 9:3-19 and Matthew 11:21. (That's right, get out you Bible!)

The service will be on Wednesday Feb. 17 beginning at 7:00 pm. Come and be renewed.

PRAYER PARTNERS: PRAYING WITH OTHERS DURING LENT

During Lent, all members of St. Andrew are urged to form a prayer partnership with two or three other others. The commitment is to come together for prayer at three times during Lent. ADULT CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**LENTEN SPIRITUAL PRACTICE – CE CLASSES AND SMALL GROUP STUDY**

The Adult CE Committee and the church officers (during the retreat) have heard the comments of many in the congregation concerning the wish to have more adult CE choices involving small group study and spirituality. We have begun making plans to expand the adult CE hour (11:00 am -12:00 pm Sunday mornings) to include at least one additional small group class each Sunday with a greater emphasis on both spirituality and scriptural study. During Lent, we will have an opportunity to learn more about spirituality and small group study from the Living Waters team at St. Andrew. There will be an opportunity for attendees to join prayer circles and to participate in small group study. On Palm Sunday, Frank will lead us in a class on spiritual biography in which attendees will be challenged to write about turning points in their lives as a spiritual practice. These spiritual biographies will be read during the first and possibly the second Sunday after Easter. After that, we anticipate offering both a topical class in the large conference room and a smaller class in the library on most Sundays.

February 14: Lenten Practices for the Individual and Family (Conference Room/Rev. Frank Yates). A discussion of how we might better recognize the period of Lent. Some families choose to limit movies or eating out during Lent. Others buy only necessities. Some individuals fast for one day or one meal each week. Others limit TV and computer time and give the time saved to friends or to the church or a charitable group. Frank will discuss the meaning and practice of Lent historically and today.

A week ago I would have never considered China, and maybe not even Asia or such a modern city, but I am growing weary of living like I'm just camping out, and would like to settle in somewhere where people will actually come and visit. HKIS was started by the Missouri Synod Church and has a Church of all Nations on campus. In fact, it is a very small world as I was asked to do a skype interview with HK and ended up having my neighbor, Terry, on Masini Lane who is also in International schools on the other end of the line.
