### Lent Begins

The Season of Lent also begins this month. It is a period of 40 days and 6 Sundays, beginning on Ash Wednesday and culminating in Holy Week. It is a time for personal reflection and prayer, a time for soul-searching and spiritual redirection, a time to renew our faith and recommit ourselves to following the way of Christ. Those of you who would like to start your Lenten observance with worship and the imposition of ashes are invited to join us for our Ash Wednesday service on February 22 at 7:00 p.m.

### Christian Education in Lent

I'll be leading a Lenten series for the Adult Christian Education class that brings together faith and science. We'll be guided by a delightful little devotional book entitled *LENT is not Rocket Science*, by W. Nicholas Knisely. From the book jacket: "What do light years and dark matter have to do with spiritual reflection during the forty days of Lent? Author W. Nicholas Knisely, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Rhode Island and former professor of astronomy and physics, invites you into a new relationship with God. Through these daily meditations, journey from the largest scale of the created order inward to the very smallest scale, learning about science along the way but much more about the complex beauty of God's creation, the truth and mystery of God's infinite love." The class will begin on Sunday, March 5, discussing the devotional readings about the universe from Ash Wednesday through the first week of Lent. Books will be available in the church office for just \$5 each. Please pick up your copy before Ash Wednesday (February 22) so you can begin your daily devotional reading as Lent begins.

## Health Ministry

*Dietary Supplements for Older Adults by Beverly Jackson*

Dietary supplements can be beneficial at any age, but they can also have unwanted side effects, or unsafe interactions with some prescription drugs. They may not have any beneficial effects. It is important to understand why you are taking them. Talking with your physician before you start a supplement is important. Dietary supplements are substances you might use to add nutrients to your diet or to lower risk of some health problems such as osteoporosis or arthritis. Supplements may come in the form of pills, capsules, tablets, extracts or liquids. They may contain vitamins, minerals, fibers, amino acids, herbs or plants or enzymes. Supplements may be added to foods or drinks. A doctor's prescription is not required which may make them seem harmless. It is always best to try and get the nutrients by eating a healthy diet. When this is not possible the doctor may recommend a dietary supplement.

If you are thinking about using a dietary supplement:

- Learn. Find out as much as you can about any dietary supplement you might take. Talk with your doctor, pharmacist or registered dietitian. A supplement that may work for a friend or family member might not work for you. Always be cautious about fact sheets or websites, check the resources. Be aware if the writer or group may profit from the product.
- Remember, just because something is advertised as natural doesn't always mean it is safe and good for you.



## The Souper Bowl of Caring Sunday, February 12



The Souper Bowl of Caring began in 1990 with a simple prayer said by Reverend Brad Smith at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, South Carolina, “Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat.” 22 churches raised \$5,700 in the first year.”

That was 1990. Since then, Tackle Hunger, with its signature Souper Bowl of Caring event has become a national, grass-roots, youth-inspired movement where ordinary people are doing extraordinary good. Over \$170 MILLION in dollars and food has been generated while benefiting thousands of soup kitchens, food banks, meal programs and other hunger-relief charities in local communities.

St Andrew has participated in this offering for many years and will continue to do so on Super Bowl Sunday, February 12. Your generosity to this offering has been outstanding. We have collected over \$2000 in each of the past two years.

The Rio Grande Food Project has been our recipient and will be again this year. At the end of the service on February 12, three people will have bowls with the name of the NFC team and AFC team competing in the Super Bowl. You are invited to vote, with your donation, for the team you think will win the Super Bowl. If you Don't Know or Don't Care there will a third bowl for your donation. This really isn't about the Super Bowl, it's about the SOUPER BOWL OF CARING and fighting hunger in our community!

## N.M. LEGISLATIVE ISSUES AND THE CLIMATE CRISIS

Two bills and one proposed act are being brought before the New Mexico state legislature during the 2023 (long) legislative session. The two bills and one proposed act are as follows:

### **THE PUBLIC HEALTH AND CLIMATE RESILIENCY ACT-- HB 42**

Climate change is increasingly harming the health of New Mexicans, and the rate of its associated extreme weather events, such as periods of extreme heat, drought and flooding – along with wildfires and air pollution – is accelerating. These hazards impact our physical and mental health in many ways, including increased rates of heat stress, insect-borne diseases, lung and heart disease, and allergies, which can lead to many downstream effects such as financial and food insecurity and a deterioration in overall well-being. New Mexico’s children, communities of color, older adults, people with disabilities, and families earning low incomes are most likely to suffer serious, long-term health consequences from these climate impacts.

All New Mexicans need to be protected from threats to health caused by extreme weather events related to climate change, which are causing harm today and will be more frequent and intense in the future. This Act will help address these threats to public health by:

- Creating a Public Health and Climate Resiliency Program at the Department of Health to build capacity and expertise, support development and implementation of response systems, and improve interagency collaboration.
- Establishing a Public Health and Climate Resiliency Fund to assist and enable local and tribal communities to adapt to climate change and respond to public health emergencies from extreme weather events.
- These two approaches, combined with meaningful engagement with the communities most harmed by climate change, will help improve health outcomes, equity, climate adaptation, and climate resiliency in New Mexico.

### **ENERGY STORAGE SYSTEM TAX CREDIT -- HB 32**

HB 32 would offer tax credits between March 2023 and January 2028, providing a credit on a taxpayer’s income tax liability of 40 percent of the purchase and installation costs of an energy storage system.

FROM HB 32:

J. As used in this section, “energy storage system” means a commercially available, customer-sited system, including a battery and a battery paired with on-site generation, that is capable of retaining, storing and delivering electrical energy by chemical, thermal, mechanical or other means and has been tested and certified by a nationally recognized testing laboratory and that: (1) is installed for use with a new or existing photovoltaic system; (2) has a rating of four kilowatts or greater with a minimum of two hours of storage; and (3) is installed as a stand-alone energy storage system; or, if the energy storage system is grid-tied, has the capability to provide grid services if control and communication infrastructure exists with the service provider;

### **N.M. Geothermal Resource Development Act – Proposed Legislation**

The issue that is proposed to be brought before the 2023 N.M. Legislative session is The New Mexico Geothermal Resource Development Act for 2023.

Our goal: Pass a geothermal energy development bill for 2023 to support the two-phase development of geothermal (GT) energy in New Mexico.

Phase 1) In the 2020s expand known existing geothermal resources: heat pumps for buildings, in green houses, hot springs and spas, for clean electricity (Lightning Dock), etc.

Phase 2) Promote longer term development of advanced geothermal electricity to provide the final 10% of clean New Mexico grid electricity through the 2030s: 1 to 3 GW.




## Presbyterian Women
