Words from Your Transitional Pastor

I thought long about what I should include in this edition of Presbytidings, and concluded that I should give some sort of update on the transition. I had just recently given our session a similar update for my January Pastor 's report, and decided that it was fitting to share with the whole congregation as well. So that is what I am doing!

January has arrived, and one of the cultural phenomena of the New Year, is New Year's resolutions; goals, intentions, things to work on or toward. I made my own personal list, and will admit that I have already adjusted those goals within the first 2 weeks of the new year. Now that I have been at St. Andrew for a little over 3 months, I feel as though I have better perspective and I believe it is time to make a list. While the items maybe not exactly be 'resolutions' *per se*, they are some of the things that I view as important in this transitional time as St. Andrew moves into a new and everchanging future. And so, I am including a list for you, know that some of these will change, some we may never get to, and other items will be added (and they are listed in no particular order). The Souper Bowl of Caring



The Souper Bowl of Caring began in 1990 with a simple prayer said by Reverend Brad Smith at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, South Carolina, "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat." 22 churches raised \$5,700 in the first year."

Since 1990, close to \$193 million has been reported donated to local food charities across all fifty states with over 305,000 unique groups participating. Every dollar donated to Souper Bowl of Caring creates over \$18 for food charities. We unite all communities to Tackle Hunger. At the end of the service on February 11, three people will have bowls with the name of the NFC team and AFC team competing in the Super Bowl. You are invited to vote, with your donation, for the team you think will win the Super Bowl. If you Don't Know or Don't Care there will a third bowl for your donation. This really isn't about the Super Bowl, it's about the SOUPER BOWL OF CARING and fighting hunger in our community!

Lenten Book Discussion

Thursdays on Zoom 5:30-6:30 pm I (Pastor Eric) will lead a discussion on the book *Dancing in the Darkness: Spiritual Lessons for Thriving in Turbulent Times*, by Otis Moss III. It is no secret that we live in a turbulent time (perhaps all times are). The book examines themes of justice, love, spiritual resistance, racism, hope, and aims to give lessons that will allow our personal and collective thriving.

The blurb on the inside of the book jacket notes that:

"Dancing in the Darkness is a "life-affirming" (Dr. Teresa L. Fry Brown) guide to the practical, political, and spiritual challenges of our day. Drawing on the teachings of Dr. King, Howard Thurman, sacred scripture, southern wisdom, global spiritual traditions, Black culture, and his own personal experiences, Dr. Moss instructs you on how to practice spiritual resistance by combining justice and love. This collection helps us tap into the spiritual reserves we all possess but too often overlook, so we can slay our personal demons, confront our civic challenges, and reach our highest goals."

I hope that you will join me as we think about our highest goals for a church, as we dream for the future, and as we root ourselves in our spiritual lives and the divine. A tentative schedule is:

This Lent, we are focusing on the life and faith of one of Jesus' most famous disciples. In Peter, we see a person who is both steadfast and unsteady, a dear friend and a betrayer, a follower and a wanderer. In Peter, we often see ourselves. By following Peter's journey, we watch the story of Jesus unfold through the eyes of a very normal human trying to figure it all out — just like us.

As we were studying Peter's faith journey, the lyrics of "Come Thou Fount" came to mind. It's as if Peter himself wrote this song. Like many of us, Peter has a wandering heart. His journey is not polished, or linear, or perfect, but he is always tethered to the love of God.

In this series, we want to affirm that faith is a constant journey of steadfast pursuit, one that ebbs and flows. We want to affirm the ways Peter keeps going: he drops his nets, he walks on water, he runs to the empty tomb, he swims to the shore to meet the risen Christ. He keeps searching and yearning and loving, even after missteps or mistakes. Ultimately, in Peter's story, we are reminded that God loves imperfect people—in fact, time and again, that's precisely who God claims and calls.

This Lent, we will look for ourselves in the stepping stones of Peter's story. We will reflect on the stages of our own faith journeys as well as who and what has shaped us along the way. As we wander, let us tune our hearts to sing God's grace. May we rest in streams of mercy, never ceasing.





AN OASIS OF PEACE



A Sunday afternoon hike in Teec Nos Pos, deep in the Navajo Nation, took me, my father and my siblings to a spot we'd never seen before. We started in the familiar arroyo bed across from the mission and followed it south and gently upward toward the blue-black Carrizo Mountains. And then we came upon it—a rare, high desert oasis, a small, spring-fed pond surrounded by granite boulders, some of them softened by velvety moss. Reeds edged the pool, and a great cottonwood's low branches brought relief from the sun. As if the discovery of water and shade weren't enough, beneath the surface we saw a cluster of glassy globes, each with a tiny black dot in the center. "Those are frog eggs," Dad told us. The place was magical, and over the years it's returned to my memory again and again.

There is a sense of peaceful respite and succor in stories and real-life experiences of oases, turning just the word into a powerful metaphor for soul-sustenance. In *The Book of Joy*, conversations between the late Archbishop Desmond Tutu and the Dalai Lama, the Archbishop tells us, "Become a reservoir of joy, an oasis of peace, a pool of serenity that can ripple out to all those around you." Recently I reread this quote, and I couldn't help thinking of St. Andrew's mission to a weary world, a world that can seem as dry as the high desert we love but from which at times we also need to find refuge and replenishment.

In Tutu's reference, the oasis of peace is meant to ripple outward, which I take to mean the cultivation of peace starts within each of us—through our connection with the Holy One in the diverse ways we find to make that connection. Our union with the Divine is the wellspring that feeds the pool at the center of the oasis. Then the first ripple can extend a spring-fed spirit of peacefulness when pain or conflicts arise with the people closest to us—family, friends, our St. Andrew family — an eagerness to provide comfort, a willingness to not insist on our own way, to not be easily provoked. Further outward then, in hospitality toward the communities we live in. And then to the world, in the many ways St. Andrew does, including in our prayer lives, perhaps praying the news as we read it or watch it. May God grant that each of us become an oasis of peace, rippling out into a weary world.


February 18 Visio Divina for Lent
