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Words from Your Pastor

With 60% of New Mexicans now fully vaccinated, Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham has announced that as of July 1, all pandemic-related limitations on mass gatherings will be lifted. Businesses, large events and organizations will be allowed to operate at their maximum capacities (both indoor and outdoors). The color-coded county-by-county system also will be discontinued. What that change will mean for in-person worship at St. Andrew will be discussed by the Worship and Music Committee at its July 1 meeting and then taken up by the Session. Stay tuned!

It's been wonderful to see so many St. Andrew church members and friends returning to in-person worship. In June, worship attendance has averaged 89, with about 57 people worshipping in person and an estimated 32 worshipping from home. And it has been delightful to be able to visit with one another face-to-face, immediately following worship during our Fellowship time in the church courtyard.

Please Wear Your Name Tags!

With our return to in-person worship, it's important to get back into the habit of wearing name tags. Why? Because we want to be a church that is open and welcoming to new people. That means making it easier for newcomers to interact with us and get to know us. It also means coming to church not only looking forward to seeing old friends but in hopeful expectation of making new ones! If you don't have a name tag, write your name on the "Name Tag" clipboard in the narthex and one will be made for you.

Child Care during Worship

Beginning August 1, St. Andrew will once again provide quality child care during Sunday morning worship services for infants, toddlers, and children up to 7 years of age. The refurbishing of our dedicated child care space is going well and our child care workers plan to return. Emphasis is placed on each child's need for love and acceptance. Children are encouraged to spend the first part of worship with their parents (or grandparents). Worship bags are available at the back of the sanctuary to assist children with participation in worship.

If you have friends, neighbors, or family members with young children, please let them know that your church provides child care. And invite them to come with you to worship on a Sunday morning. In addition to being a friendly, welcoming congregation, we also need to be an inviting congregation. Think about what you love about St. Andrew that keeps you coming back week after week, and let people know about it. Why keep it a secret? Share it with others!

More about ABQ FaithWorks Collaborative

FaithWorks was established in 2019 as an alliance of churches in response to the needs of people who came knocking on the doors of churches in the Nob Hill area. We wanted to respond to the needy with more than a 'water bottle and a granola bar'. There are now a dozen churches of many denominations working together in our community, serving marginalized populations – the unsheltered and resident migrants. We help the needy unhoused who come to the door at the First Congregational UCC church on Lomas & Girard by providing clothing, some food, and connections to other short and longer-term resource providers for their support. We also have a program providing community sponsorship for migrant families resident in Albuquerque, assisting them to navigate the cultural and legal hurdles toward community self-sufficiency. We provide direct service in many ways, including through food pantries, rent assistance and referrals to outside expert service providers.

Each program at FaithWorks has its unique characteristics and client populations, and there is overlap in the basic humanitarian needs of clothing, food, shelter and transportation. We have built teams that provide this support under the guidance of our Coordinators: Valerie Griego for social work with the unhoused, and Jessica Corley with asylum seekers. REMEMBER THE CHILDREN

On a Saturday evening in early June, a man stole the dolls representing the separated children from Central America out of our social art display in front of the church. A neighbor of St. Andrew took pictures of the theft and informed us of it. While the dolls may be gone, the separated children remain in our memory and on our conscience. We will not forget them.

As part of the past presidential administration's "zero tolerance" policy, children were torn from their families as they sought asylum at our southern border. The inhumanness of the policy was coupled with the incompetence of the administration, leading to a lack of records of where the children were taken and to whom they belong. The ACLU filed suit and has been instrumental in the efforts to reunite the children with their families. According to the ACLU, 1,786 children have been reunited with 2,127 children yet to go. Due to the lack of records, the reuniting process remains glacially slow under the current administration.

Will you help us remember those children? On Sunday, July 11, after worship, we are asking the

St. Andrew Withdraws Membership from Albuquerque Interfaith

It is with sadness, and after much prayerful consideration, that St. Andrew Presbyterian Church has voted to withdraw from Albuquerque Interfaith. St. Andrew was the first Protestant church to become part of the organization, joining long before it was even named. Several members of St. Andrew, especially women from the congregation, were key in AI's initial founding and energy, so the decision to withdraw was difficult but necessary.

Unfortunately, rather than being a broad-based leadership development organization, AI has instead become an organization in which a small number of men have inordinate influence and at times have been dismissive of women's voices. In fact, none of the women from St. Andrew who have been leaders in AI in the past will currently get involved at any level with AI, because of what they have experienced as closed and unwelcoming leadership.

Also, while accountability is supposed to be a cornerstone of broad-based organizing, it is sorely lacking at AI. A specific example is the fact that thousands of dollars, perhaps as many as \$40,000, were donated to the 2019 asylum seeker effort but were spent on AI's general operating budget rather than food and housing for the asylum seekers. The AI Executive Team put far too much trust in AI's lead organizer, neglected its oversight responsibilities, and, when financial reports were not forthcoming, waited far too long to demand accountability and transparency. Furthermore, there was never an investigation to find out the extent to which funds were misused.

While AI's lead organizer resigned in August 2019, we were very troubled to learn that he has been involved in the organization since then and that his spouse is now an influential leader in AI. We believe their continued involvement in AI to be inappropriate.

With the many needs and injustices in our community, St. Andrew is currently choosing to put its time, talent, and resources elsewhere. However, in the future if Albuquerque Interfaith makes changes for the better that address our concerns, we will consider rejoining the organization as a member institution.

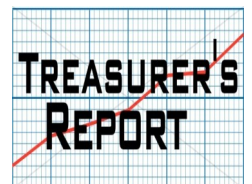

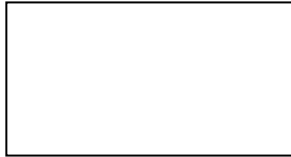
